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Purpose of this Submission

The City of Melbourne has prepared this submission to the Regional Electronic Gaming Machine (EGM) Caps Review Panel, (REGMCRP) to seek restrictions on EGM's in its municipality.

Reasons for this Submission - Implications of this review for the CoM

In 2001 the State Government implemented regional caps on EGM's in areas of relatively lower socio-economic status, high average player losses on EGM's and with higher than average densities of poker machines per '000 adults. This resulted in five regions being capped: Bass Coast; Dandenong plus; Darebin plus; La Trobe and Maribyrnong plus. Plus refers to areas believed to be vulnerable that crossed municipal boundaries.

The Government has decided to extend the size of existing capped regions and increase the number of Local Government Areas (LGA's) in which EGM numbers are limited, by creating new capped regions. The proposals are identified in Appendix 1. One of the proposed new regions is "Moonee Valley Plus", which includes yet to be determined parts of Moreland and the City of Melbourne.

The first round of regional caps in 2001 reduced the number of EGMs by 7% in five State Government identified vulnerable communities.

In addition, any new caps applied to other municipalities have the potential for a redistribution of EGMs into "uncapped" municipalities such as the City of Melbourne.

How EGM venues and numbers are currently controlled within the CoM

Council acknowledges that gambling is a recreational activity which most people can enjoy without problems, but is keen to reduce the incidence of problem gambling and its effects in the community. Problem gambling refers to the situation in which a person's gambling activity gives rise to harm to the individual player, and/or his or her family, and potentially the community.

While the City of Melbourne does not have a Responsible Gambling Policy, it does support Responsible Gambling Legislation and participates in networks that discuss the issues of gambling and gambling regulation, such as the Local Government Working Groups on Gambling (LWGOG), hosted by the Victorian Local Governance Association (VLGA).

The State Government's Gambling Legislation (Responsible Gambling) Act, introduced in 2000, provided for limits to be set on the numbers of gaming machines in specific regions and for the views of a municipal council to be taken into account when the Victorian Commission for Gambling Regulation (VCGR) is considering the placement of EGMs in municipal districts.

The VCGR regulates the provision of EGMs in Victoria. Crown, Tattersall and Tabcorp are the only companies licensed to own and operate EGMs in this State.

A person (natural or corporate) seeking to install EGMs in any venue in Victoria must have an agreement with a gaming machine operator to supply a number of machines and apply to the VCGR for a licence to be a venue operator, and nominate a premises to be approved for gaming and included on their licence, should it be granted. Any change in the number of EGMs operating from an existing venue, or to add or remove premises from a venue operator license also requires an application to the VCGR.

For a venue to be eligible to be approved as a gaming venue, it must possess one of the following licences: a general licence under section 8 of the *Liquor Control Reform Act 1998*; a club licence (whether full or restricted) under section 10 of the *Liquor Control Reform Act 1998*; or a licence under Part I of the *Racing Act 1958*.

EGMs are permitted as in Licensed premises in Victoria, based on a 25 % of the gross licensed floor area, but venues are restricted from certain specific areas eg 'strip' shopping centres. The number of machines in a venue is not allowed to exceed 105.

In deciding to approve new premises, or increase the number of EGMs at existing premises, the VCGR considers the economic and social impact of the proposal on the well being of the community within a municipal district in which the premises are located, taking into account the impact on surrounding municipal districts. The VCGR gives the Council in which the venue is located the opportunity to consider the socio-economic impact of the proposal and make a submission in relation to that application.

The VCGR uses the Socio Economic Index For Areas (SEIFA) Index of Disadvantage, (developed by the Australian Bureau of Statistics), to assess the well being of a community. This index focuses on low income earners, relatively lower educational attainment and high unemployment.

City of Melbourne's Planning Controls

The Melbourne Planning Scheme sets out Council's current policy regarding gaming premises and gambling (see Appendix 2). In summary, the Crown Casino and "as of right" provisions in licensed premises are considered to more than adequately provide for gambling in the City and Council will not encourage any further increase in gambling and will actively discourage it in residential areas.

City of Melbourne's approach to gambling issues

The City of Melbourne considers any application for a new EGM venue (or changes to an existing one) on its merit, taking into account the likely the socio-economic impact of the proposal, using the SEIFA index of disadvantage. Since the introduction of the Responsible Gambling Act in 2000 Council has received and responded to the following applications for approval of premises for gambling or to vary the number of EGM's:

1. Flemington Racecourse; and
2. Capricornia at Batmans Hill.

EGM Venues in the City of Melbourne

At present there are a total of 3,384 EGMs within the City of Melbourne. Crown Casino currently has the maximum (capped) amount of 2,500 electronic gaming machines. Figure 1 below lists venues, their location and number of machines and their Zones.

Figure 2 on page 5 shows the distribution of EGM venues within the municipality, in relation to areas of disadvantage as measured by the SEIFA index.

The latest preliminary data available reports that expenditures on gambling machines in the city of Melbourne totalled \$66,090,193.81 last financial year and \$11,858,236.82 in the first two months of this financial year. These figures exclude Crown Casino.

Conclusion

The City of Melbourne's existing planning controls seek to limit the number of EGMs in the municipality, restrict their location to non-residential areas and minimise the potential for problem gambling.

Currently EGM numbers are only capped in the Crown Casino and restricted from the 'strip' shopping centres

Any new caps applied to other municipalities have the potential for a redistribution of EGMs into "uncapped" municipalities such as the City of Melbourne.

One of the proposed new capped regions is "Moonee Valley Plus", which includes yet to be determined parts of Moreland and the City of Melbourne.

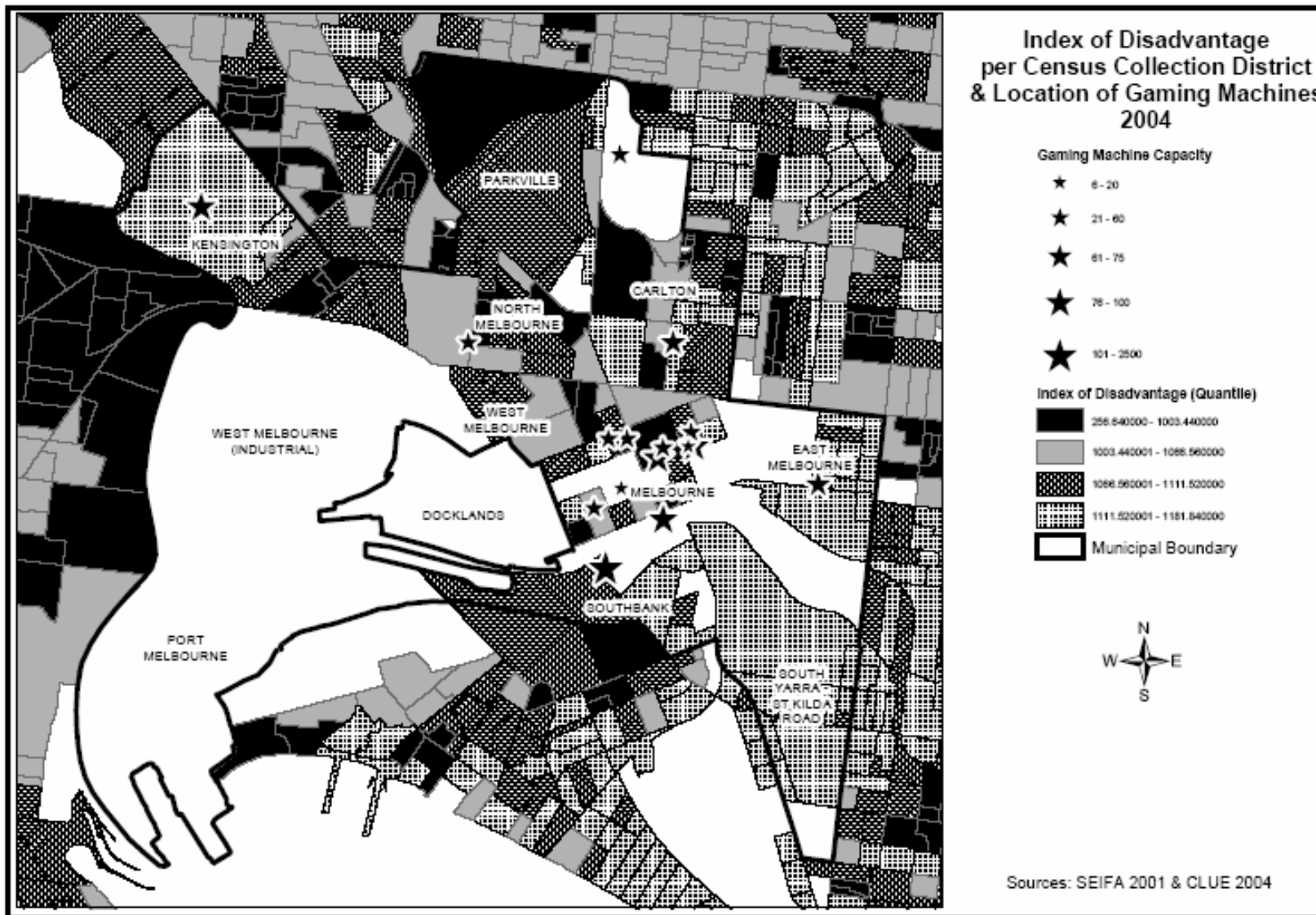
On this basis the City of Melbourne requests the Review Panel to restrict EGM numbers to the current level and distribution in the municipality. Any redistribution should be from residential to non-residential areas with a range of other entertainment facilities such as the City and Southbank.

Recommendations

The City of Melbourne recommends that the Regional Electronic Gaming Machine Caps Review Panel advise the Minister for Gaming to:

1. Restrict the number of EGMs in the City of Melbourne to its current level;
2. In future, give preference to gaming machine venue applications that redistribute EGMs to non-residential areas that are considered to have a lower level of vulnerability to the negative impacts of gaming; and
3. establish specific guidelines regarding proximity and accessibility of gaming machines to areas of vulnerability, to assist councils in responding to applications for gaming machine venues.

Appendix 1 Regional Electronic Gaming Machine Caps Review Panel – Terms of Reference

Regional Electronic Gaming Machine Caps Review Panel

Consultation Paper

Between the introduction of gaming machines to Victoria in 1992 and the election of the Bracks Government in 1999, the number of gaming machines in Victoria grew to 30,000. A consequence of this growth has been a concentration of gaming machines in areas with high socio-economic disadvantage.

In response to concerns that even more venues and machines would be put into areas of socio-economic vulnerability, the Bracks Government capped the total number of gaming machines in the State at 30,000 and introduced regional caps to protect areas with high socio-economic disadvantage.

The first round of regional caps reduced the number of gaming machines by 7% in five identified 'vulnerable communities' which covered a significant proportion of Victoria's vulnerable population. Machine numbers were capped in the local government areas of Maribyrnong, Greater Dandenong, Darebin, Bass Coast Shire and the City of La Trobe.

Through the introduction of gaming machine caps, the Government has stopped the spread of machines in Victoria. On 7 March 2005, the Minister for Gaming, John Pandazopoulos, announced the formation of a panel to undertake a broader gaming machine caps policy review and to advise the Government on how best to implement the next round of regional gaming machine caps.

Terms of Reference

The Review Panel consists of three Government members of the Parliament and is administratively supported by the Office of Gaming and Racing in the Department of Justice.

The Panel is requested to consider:

- the Government's regional caps election policy commitment;
- the available research regarding existing capped areas; and
- the geographic concentration of electronic gaming machines, and in particular the high density of gaming machines in areas with high socio-economic disadvantage.

and to make recommendations on:

- addressing these issues;
- implementing the election commitment; and
- the possibility of an extended caps policy.

The Panel is requested to report its findings by the end of August 2005.

Chair of the Panel is the Member for Bentleigh, Rob Hudson.

The Panel also consists of the Member for Narre Warren, Luke Donnellan and the Member for Ballarat West, Karen Overington.

The purpose of this paper is to provide background information for interested parties on the Government's regional electronic gaming machine caps policy, to identify particular issues that the Panel seeks information on and to invite submissions and seek the views of interested parties on the issues raised.

Appendix 2 The City of Melbourne's Planning Controls Regarding Gaming Machine Venues

MELBOURNE PLANNING SCHEME

22.12 GAMING PREMISES

This policy applies to applications for gaming premises in the Mixed Use Zone, Public Use Zone, Public Park and Recreational Zone, Business Zones and Industrial Zones. It is noted that gaming premises are prohibited in the Residential 1 Zone.

Policy Basis

Clause 21.04-2 of the Municipal Strategic Statement sets out objectives and strategies for recreation, entertainment and the arts. These strategies include ensuring that the operation of entertainment venues maintains an appropriate level of amenity within the municipality and that gaming premises do not form concentrations in particular areas. Gaming machines are discouraged in residential areas.

There are a number of gaming premises throughout the Central City and in nearby business zones. There are also a large number of existing licensed premises in other zones where gaming could be introduced in the future.

Objectives

- To ensure that amenity, social and economic impacts of gaming are considered when deciding on a planning application.
- To encourage applicants to submit a social and economic impact assessment with the planning application.
- To ensure that gaming premises are primarily located in existing venues in commercial centres.
- To ensure that gaming premises are established in locations that will not detract from the amenity of surrounding residential areas.
- To restrict the proliferation of gaming premises in areas where residential use is encouraged.
- To ensure that a new gaming premises is consistent with the purpose of the zone applying to the land.

Policy

It is policy to require a detailed social and economic impact assessment with any planning application.

It is policy that proposals are assessed against the following criteria:

- Gaming should be located in existing licensed premises that have a range of other entertainment uses.
- Proposals for gaming on public land should be ancillary to the existing use of the land and be consistent with the zoning intent for the land.
- Gaming premises should not be located adjacent to existing residential uses.
- Alterations to the external appearance of the premises and any advertising signs should be of high quality design and should not detract from the visual appearance and amenity of the surrounding area.
- Signs advertising gaming should not be a dominant feature of any building in which gaming is located.

It is policy that the responsible authority consider, as appropriate:

- Likely traffic and car parking demand generated by the proposal.
- Whether the hours of operation change the intensity of the existing use and its compatibility with surrounding uses.
- Whether the social and economic impact assessment supports the location of the gaming premises
- The extent to which electronic gaming machines are located in the subject area.
- Whether the amenity impacts and appearance are detrimental to the surrounding
- Whether alternative entertainment uses exist within the venue.

Policy Reference

Gaming Machine Policy (1997)

Safety

City safety is a priority and, while Melbourne is a safe city by world standards, Council must strive to ensure that no citizen or group in the community is excluded from public areas through fear. Public areas, including streets and car parks, must be designed and maintained to be safe and to be perceived as safe. Natural surveillance can be generated by the proximity of other people, good lighting and clear lines of sight.

The off-site impacts of sexually explicit adult establishments and amusement parlours have attracted considerable adverse comment from the community. Experience shows that social problems can occur on the street where these particular activities are concentrated. Grouping of these activities encourages congregations of people that may cause problems including anti-social and threatening behaviour. Council will take such action as it can to prevent these problems.

The Crown Entertainment Complex casino, and the number of gaming machines allowed 'as of right' in licensed premises, more than adequately provide for gambling in the City. Council will not encourage any further increase in gambling, and will actively discourage it in residential areas until its community impacts are better analysed and understood.

Access

Movement within and around the City must be possible by all transport modes including walking, wheelchair, cycling, bus, tram, train, taxi, car, motor-cycle, river, in-line skates and skateboards. A significant proportion (28 per cent at the 1996 census) of the population chooses not to maintain or does not have access to a car. Public transport is particularly important in the City. The City is very well served with public transport infrastructure, and increasing its use can reduce car use. Complex multi-location trips out of peak hours are not adequately provided for by current public transport services.

Outcome 4.5.1

A high standard of amenity in the City

To contribute to this, Council will:

- when considering new development or uses, give priority consideration to residential amenity and character in residential and mixed-use zones
- not support:
 - late-night entertainment venues, restaurants and cafes in residential areas
 - expansion of shopping or commercial strips into residential areas
 - sexually explicit adult establishments or amusement parlours in an agglomeration or where these would create, or contribute to, a public nuisance or would detrimentally affect the character of an area
 - ***gaming machines, sexually explicit establishments or amusement parlours in any residential area***
- encourage mixed-use or light-industrial buffer areas between residential and industrial areas
- require residential development, especially in the central city, to have noise and dust insulation adequate for city conditions
- prepare and disseminate information about living in the City and the need for noise attenuation and special construction methods in the CBD to isolate residents from noisy activities
- ensure that women's particular concerns are considered in city planning and design, such as safety, facilities for children and features that make the city more 'comfortable', including easy access to toilets for wheelchairs and pushers, and seating and soft landscaping.

52.28 GAMING

52.28-1 Restricted area - no permit required

No permit is required to install and use a gaming machine in a restricted area if that area does not exceed 25 per cent of the gross floor area of the premises where liquor may be consumed.

The gross floor area where liquor may be consumed does not include bedrooms, external drinking and dining areas, service areas, kitchens, area behind bars, storage areas, administrative areas, lifts, stairs, ramps, escalators, corridors, hallways, lobbies, service ducts, plant rooms and toilets.

52.28-2 Restricted area - no permit required - strip shopping centres

Despite clause 52.28-1, if a restricted area is located in a hotel or club in a strip shopping centre – (aa) specified in clause 52.28-6(aa) or (ab) to which clause 52.28-6(ab) applies no permit is required to install or use a gaming machine in a restricted area provided all of the following requirements are met.

(a) If the hotel or club existed on 19 December 1997:

- (i) the floor area of the restricted area must not exceed 25 per cent of the gross floor area of the premises where liquor may be consumed as at 16 June 1998, and
- (ii) the restricted area must be located on the land used as a hotel or club on 16 June 1998.

(b) If the hotel or club existed on 19 December 1997 and

- (i) if a permit to use or develop alterations and extensions to that hotel or club is in force on 16 June 1998 in relation only to the whole or part of the land used as a hotel or club on 19 December 1997, and
- (ii) if a residential licence, general (class 1) licence or club licence (whether full or restricted) under sections 46, 47 or 48, respectively, of the Liquor Control Act 1987 has been granted on or before 16 June 1998 or a determination to grant such a licence has been made on or before 16 June 1998 in relation to those alterations and extensions:
- (iii) the floor area of the restricted area must not exceed 25 per cent of a combination of the gross floor area of the premises where liquor may be consumed as at 16 June 1998 and any increase to that gross floor area approved in or under the permit at 16 June 1998, and
- (iv) the restricted area must be located on the land used as a hotel or club on 16 June 1998.

(c) If the hotel or club existed on 19 December 1997 and

- (i) if a permit to use or develop alterations and extensions to that hotel or club is in force on 16 June 1998 in relation to the whole or part of the land used as a hotel or club on 19 December 1997 together with adjoining land not used as a hotel or club on 19 December 1997; and
- (ii) if a residential licence, general (class 1) licence or club licence (whether full or restricted) under sections 46, 47 or 48, respectively, of the Liquor Control Act 1987 has been granted on or before 16 June 1998 or a determination to grant

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such a licence has been made on or before 16 June 1998 in relation to those alterations and extensions:

- (iii) the floor area of the restricted area must not exceed 25 per cent of a combination of the gross floor area of the premises where liquor may be consumed as at 16 June 1998 and any increase to that gross floor area approved in or under the permit at 16 June 1998, and
 - (iv) the restricted area must be located on the land being a combination of the land used as a hotel or club on 16 June 1998 and the land to which that permit relates.
- (d) If the use as a hotel or club started after 19 December 1997 and is land to which clause 52.28-6(b) applies:

(i) the floor area of the restricted area must not exceed 25 per cent of the proposed gross floor area of the premises where liquor may be consumed approved in or under the permit in force at 16 June 1998, and

(ii) the restricted area must be located on the land to which the permit in force at 16 June 1998 for the hotel or club relates.

(e) If the use as a hotel or club started after 19 December 1997 and is land to which clause 52.28-6(c) applies:

(i) the floor area of the restricted area must not exceed 25 per cent of the proposed gross floor area of the premises where liquor may be consumed approved in or under a permit in force at 16 June 1998 for the re-building of the former hotel or club, and

(ii) the restricted area must be located on the land to which the permit in force at 16 June 1998 for the hotel or club relates.

In this clause, 'gross floor area of the premises where liquor may be consumed' excludes the same floor areas excluded from the expression 'gross floor area where liquor may be consumed' in clause 52.28-1.

52.28-3 Restricted area - permit required

A permit is required to install or use a gaming machine in a restricted area if the requirement is not met and the installation and use of one or more gaming machines is not otherwise permitted under the scheme.

This requirement applies even if gaming is ancillary to another use of the land.

No permit may be granted if the restricted area is in a hotel or club in a strip shopping centre-

- (a) specified in clause 52.28-6(aa) or
- (b) to which clause 52.28-6(ab) applies.

52.28-4 Unrestricted area - no permit required

No permit is required to install and use a gaming machine in an unrestricted area.

52.28-5 Gaming machines - prohibited in shopping complexes

Despite clauses 52.28-1 to 52.28-4 (inclusive), land described in the schedule to this clause must not be used for gaming and no gaming machine may be installed or used in any building on the land.

This does not apply to a part of the land in relation to which a permit granted to install or use a gaming machine in a restricted area is in force on 20 December 1995.

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52.28-6 Gaming machines - prohibited in strip shopping centres

This clause does not apply in the municipal districts of Cardinia Shire, Delatite Shire and Golden Plains Shire.

Despite clauses 52.28-1, 52.28-3 and 52.28-4, no gaming machine may be used or installed in any building on land in a strip shopping centre -

- (aa) specified in the schedule to this clause, or
- (ab) in a municipal district in respect of which no strip shopping centre is specified in the schedule to this clause.

This does not apply to any of the following:

- (a) Land used as a hotel or club on 19 December 1997.
- (b) Land not used as a hotel or club on 19 December 1997 in relation to which:
 - (i) a permit to use or develop a hotel or club has been granted and is in force on 16 June 1998 and
 - (ii) a residential licence, general (class 1) licence or club licence (whether full or restricted) under sections 46, 47 or 48, respectively, of the Liquor Control Act 1987 has been granted on or before 16 June 1998 or a determination to grant such a licence has been made on or before 16 June 1998.

Despite the definition of 'hotel' and 'club' in clause 52.28-7:

- (A) no premises are deemed to fall outside the definition of 'hotel' in clause 52.28-6(b)(i) by virtue only of the fact that a residential licence or general (class 1)

licence under sections 46 or 47, respectively, of the Liquor Control Act 1987 has not been granted in respect of the premises at the date the permit was granted, and

(B) no premises are deemed to fall outside the definition of 'club' in clause 52.28-6(b)(i) by virtue only of the fact that a club licence (whether full or restricted) under section 48 of the Liquor Control Act 1987 has not been granted in respect of the premises at the date the permit was granted.

(c) Land not used as a hotel or club on 19 December 1997 if:

(i) the land was lawfully used as a hotel or club before 19 December 1997, and
(ii) all or part of the hotel or club was destroyed by fire between 1 September 1992 and 16 June 1998.

(d) Land in relation to which a permit granted to install or use a gaming machine in a restricted area is in force on 19 December 1997.

52.28-7 Definitions

In this clause and in clause 19.02:

"club" means land used by members of a club or group, or by members' guests, for religious or cultural activities, entertainment or meetings, and in respect of which a club licence (whether full or restricted) under section 48 of the Liquor Control Act 1987 is in force.

"hotel" means land used to:

- sell liquor for consumption on and off the premises, in respect of which a general (class 1) licence under section 47 of the Liquor Control Act 1987 is in force, or
- provide accommodation in serviced rooms for persons away from their normal place of residence, in respect of which a residential licence under section 46 of the Liquor Control Act 1987 is in force.

"strip shopping centre" means an area:

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- zoned for business use, and
 - consisting of at least two separate buildings on at least two separate and adjoining lots, and
 - in which a significant proportion of the buildings are shops, and
 - in which a significant proportion of the lots abut a road accessible to the public generally,
- but does not include the Capital City Zone in the Melbourne Planning Scheme
