Notice of Motion, Lord Mayor Sally Capp: City of Melbourne Support for COVID-19 Vaccine

Motion

- 1. That the Future Melbourne Committee:
 - 1.1. Notes that COVID-19 related restrictions including lockdowns have had a devastating effect on the economy and liveability of the City of Melbourne.
 - 1.2. Notes that a significantly vaccinated population is the key to avoiding future lockdowns associated with COVID-19, and that vaccinations are essential to beating COVID-19 and ending the public health crisis.
 - 1.3. Notes that the City of Melbourne can play a greater role in encouraging Victorians to get vaccinated.
 - 1.4. Requests management to urgently:
 - 1.4.1. Boost our communication campaign in multiple languages using both online and physical assets to urge Victorians to get a COVID-19 vaccination as soon as they are eligible, to ensure the City remains open.
 - 1.4.2. Deliver an incentive program exclusive to people who have been vaccinated including a premium offer such as a retail and hospitality package in the City of Melbourne
 - 1.5. Notes that these new activities can be funded with money that has already been budgeted for reactivation and recovery activities.

Background

- 2. Lockdowns resulting from COVID-19 have imposed a significant social and economic burden on Melbourne's economy. Having a vaccinated population significantly reduces the spread and danger of COVID-19, and would therefore reduce the likelihood of further lockdowns to Melbourne.
- 3. Victoria has seen a significant increase in COVID-19 vaccine uptake since the fourth lockdown began, however, according to the latest <u>Essential Poll</u> 32% of Victorians report vaccine hesitancy with a further 12% stating that they would choose against getting the vaccine. While this polling shows an improvement on previous polls, there remains a sizeable portion of Victorians who would delay or refuse to be vaccinated. Encouraging the 44% of Victorians who are hesitant or against getting a COVID-19 vaccine should be a priority of all levels of government.
- 4. The City of Melbourne could utilise its online and physical assets through an amplified communications campaign to further support and encourage those who are vaccine hesitant to obtain a COVID-19 vaccine when they are eligible.
- 5. This communications campaign aligns with our Council Plan 2021-2025, which prioritises our community's public health and wellbeing.
- 6. Australia's Therapeutic Goods Administration has recently permitted the provision of incentives and rewards for people who have been fully vaccinated. As shown by a number of cities across the world, further incentives such as lotteries have been successful in encouraging increased uptake of the COVID-19 vaccine, with some lotteries improving vaccine uptake by 45%. To further encourage people to receive the COVID-19 vaccine the City of Melbourne could deliver a lottery competition that would offer a unique and exciting city-based experience.
