# Committee's recommended changes to the draft Council Plan 2021–2025

#### Health and Wellbeing Plan

The Public Health and Wellbeing Act 2008 outlines the legislative requirements of municipal public health and wellbeing plans.

Section 27 of the Act gives Councils the option to seek an exemption from producing a municipal public health and wellbeing plan by including public health and wellbeing matters in a Council Plan. Councils wishing to take this option seek an exemption from the Secretary of the Department of Health. The City of Melbourne application for exemption was submitted on 25 May.
